Washington Department of Ecology and the EPA will send notices of changes to their requirements to those folks who register on their websites.

EPA is funded by Federal government.

Washington Department of Ecology is funded by Federal government.

Hanford Regulators:

1. EPA - regulates things not delegated to others (i.e., PCBs)
2. Department of Health (i.e., radioactive air emissions)
3. Department of Ecology (i.e., sole regulator of all )
4. Local Air Pollution Control Authority (i.e., asbestos, fugitive dust, open burning, etc.)

Tri-Party Agreement:

- between the State Department of Ecology, DOE, and the EPA
- compliance agreement

Consider storm water regulations that help mitigate stuff going into the drains.

Consider bio-based (plant-based) products.

Beware of labels on products. Some may be misleading. They might say "green" or "USDA tested for green" .

Consider hiring a consultant if your company has an air monitoring issue/complaint.

Look at MSDS before the product is shipped onsite.

When salesmen want to give you samples, get the smallest size you can and remember that you have to dispose of it.
